
Annual Mango Melee Set to Delight St. Croix on July 7

The annual Mango Melee and Tropical Fruit Festival is scheduled for Sunday, July 7 at the St. George Village Botanical Garden on St. Croix. <u>Last year</u>, the event bustled with excitement as Yasmine Tuitt, 14, defended her title and emerged victorious in the Mango Eating Competition for the second consecutive year at the 27th annual Mango Melee. In the children's category, 9-year-old Anita Thomas won the Mango Eating Competition, earning a \$30 Sorbetiere Ice Cream coupon and \$50 gift certificates to both Nate's Boat House and Grapetree Bay.

The Mango Melee has evolved into a beloved community event that not only pays tribute to mangoes but also supports local vendors. Last year, vendors offered a wide variety of mangoinspired delicacies, including mango pineapple salsa, mango rum, mango sweet chili sauce, mango cheesecake cups, mango ice cream, mango grilled chicken, and mango summer rolls.
