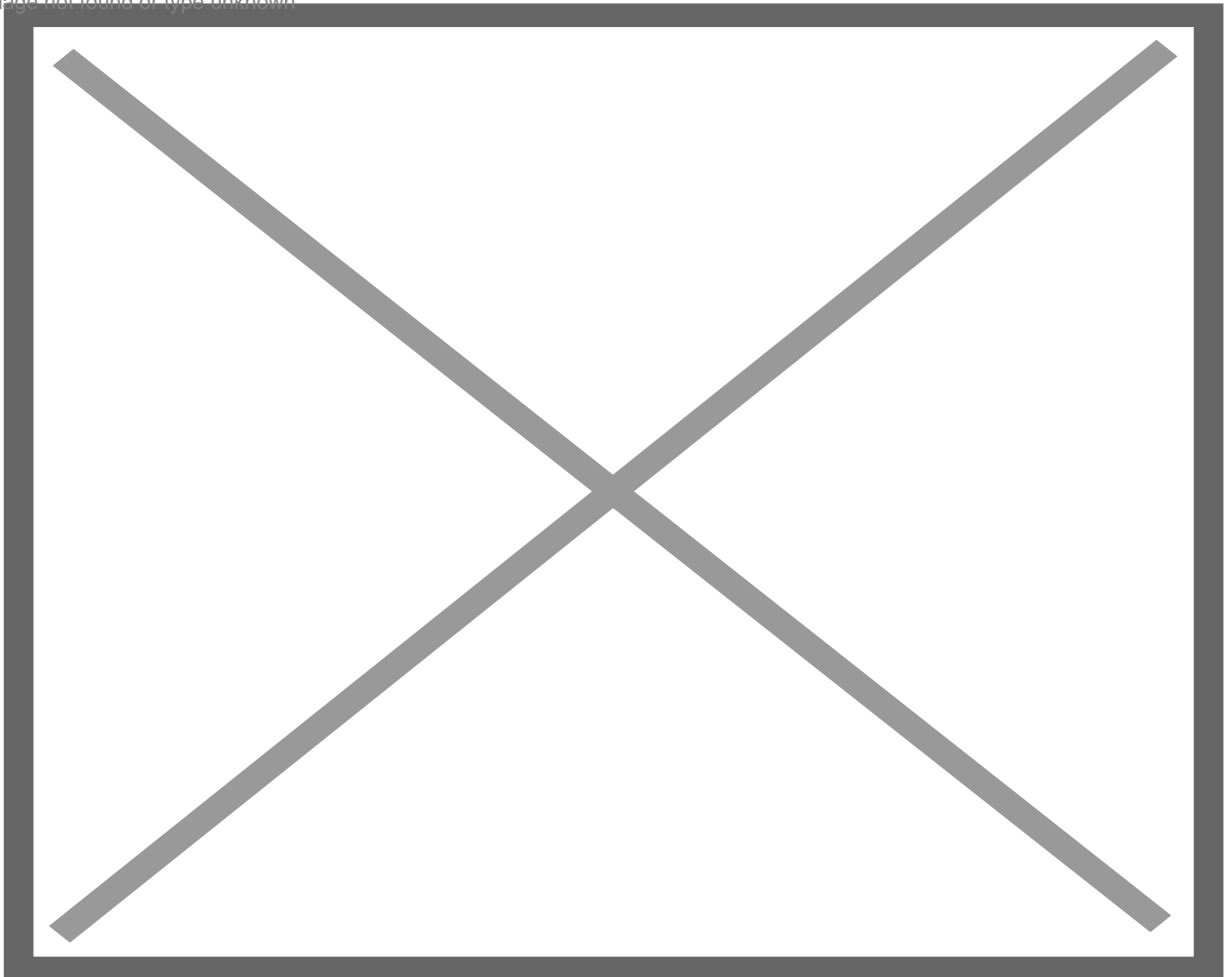
St. Thomas Native Among South College Orlando Nursing Students Selected for Orlando Health Dedicated Education Unit
