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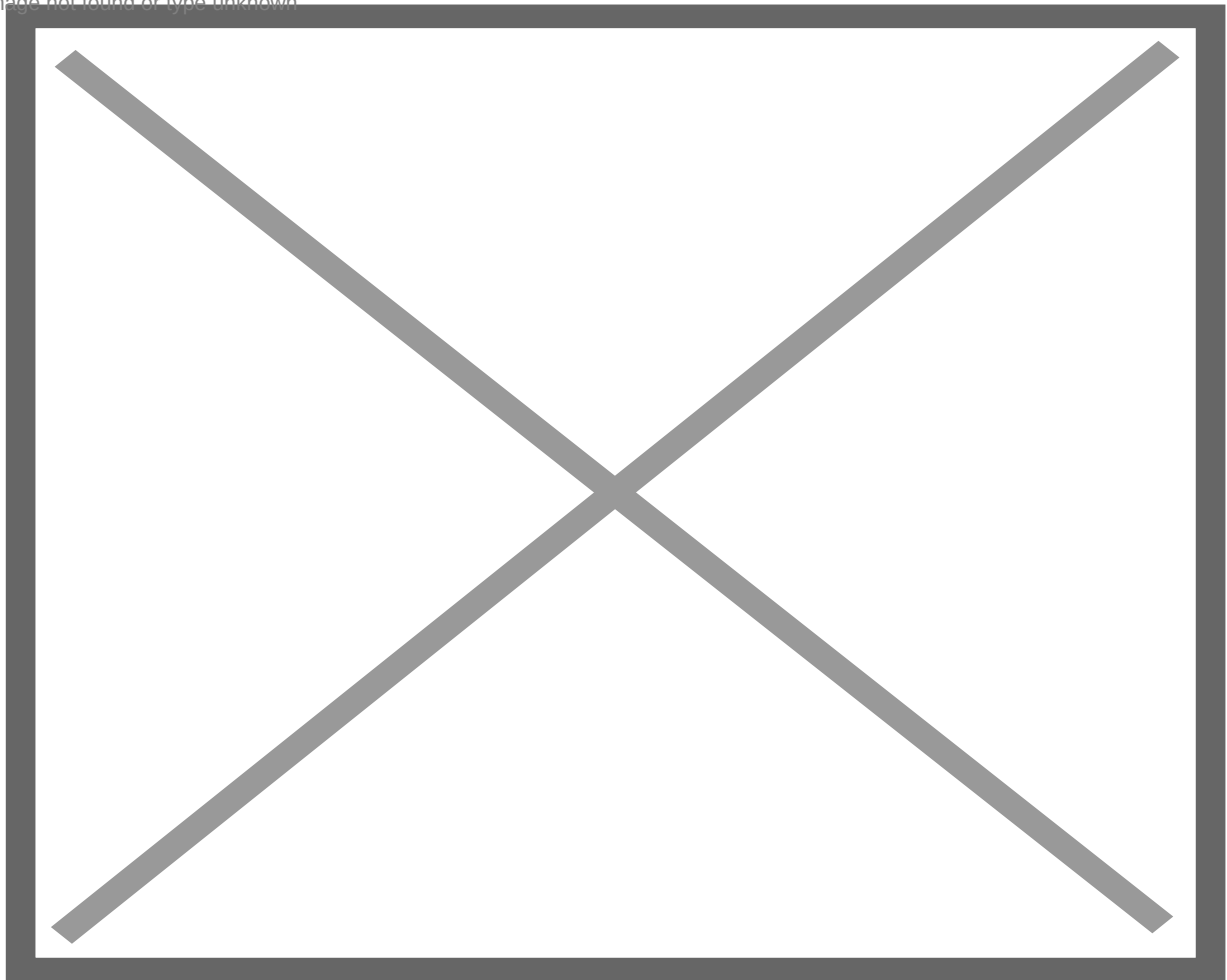
Ocean Point Awards \$16,000 in Scholarships to Eight USVI Students

Eight Virgin Islands students pursuing college degrees and technical training will share \$16,000 in scholarships from Ocean Point Terminals for the 2026-2027 academic year, with recipients

headed to institutions including the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Howard University, Florida A&M University and Tulsa Welding School.

Ocean Point announced the recipients of its annual scholarship program on August 19. The company said awards are based on academic achievement, financial need and overall applicant merit and are intended to support students pursuing degrees and certifications at accredited colleges, universities and technical or vocational institutions across the United States.

Their hard work, dedication, and aspirations inspire us, and we look forward to seeing the positive impact they will make in the Virgin Islands and beyond.”

Ocean Point said the scholarship initiative forms part of a broader education and workforce-development program through which the company contributes more than \$200,000 annually toward training, scholarships and educational initiatives. That includes support for the University of the Virgin Islands’ Process Technology Program, which prepares students for careers in industry and technology.

Since launching the scholarship initiative in 2016, Ocean Point said it has supported 141 students pursuing post-secondary education. The company reported that it has invested more than \$1 million in scholarships and workforce training programs over that period.
