
One Beach on St. Croix, Three in St. Thomas and One on St. John Not Safe This Weekend

The Department of Planning and Natural Resources (DPNR) has announced that the Beach Water Quality Monitoring Program, which evaluates weekly water quality at popular swimming beaches throughout the Territory by sampling for Enterococci Bacteria and Turbidity, which is a measure of water clarity, advises the public of the following:

DPNR performed water quality analysis at 35 designated beaches throughout the Territory during the week of November 11-15, 2019. The following beaches meet water quality standards and are safe for swimming or fishing:

Therefore, the water quality of this beach is unknown.
